Australia, a piece of land located on the Planet Earth, got its colonization simply because of criminals. In the late 1700s, Britain claimed the territory and used it as a dumping ground for its many criminals. Penthian guard dogs have massive claws, which they prefer to use for disemboweling their pray

before sinking their large tusks into the jugular vein, bleeding their pray to death.

Klingons, in an almost humanoid fashion, also enjoy pitting the guard dogs against each other in a Michael Vick fashion, hosting gambling rings for their favorite guard dogs. The dogs are also used to punish disobedient prisoners, though they are only allowed to severely wound in these cases.
